As part of science week, we read 'The Gingerbread Man' and investigated what would happen to the Gingerbread Man if he went across the river without the fox's help. The Gingerbread Man went soggy, and we enjoyed finding out if this could happen to other biscuits too. We also enjoyed a visit from the Dogs Trust and a Dinosaur workshop. What a busy and exciting week!











KS1

This week, we have enjoyed finishing off our bunting on the characteristics of the UK. Thank you to all of the parent helpers that gave up their time this week, it is greatly appreciated. The children really enjoyed the activity and were very pleased with their finished product! In RE, we started our learning on The Easter Story. We looked at Palm Sunday and Jesus' arrival to Jerusalem. We thought about how we would greet Jesus if he was alive today. The children had some lovely ideas. We have also taken part in many science week activities, we completed an investigation: 'Which biscuit would make the best dunker?' and we had a dinosaur workshop and a dogs trust workshop in the hall. It has been lots of fun!

















LKS2

This week has been Science Week and LKS2 have been helping the teachers with their lunch time brews. The teachers were getting fed up with breaking biscuits when dunking them into their cups of tea so they wanted to know 'What is the ideal temperature of tea for dunking a biscuit?' To do this the children came up with several measures to ensure this was a fair test such as keeping the biscuit, the volume of water and container the same. We also made sure the biscuit was dunked for a consistent amount of time. Once this was established, we counted the number of dunks and found that the hotter the water, the quicker the biscuit disintegrated. So our results suggested that a warm cup of tea is better for dunking than one of about 50 degrees C as this would lead to breakages quite quickly.











UKS2

This week has been packed with exciting enrichment opportunities. It started with a visit from Mrs. Hardicre, a dance teacher at PHS, who taught a dance session to the Year 6 children. They choreographed a dance inspired by basketball, incorporating the rhythmic bounce of the ball and the skills intrinsic to the game. Their final pieces were fantastic.

Meanwhile, as Lower Park embraced Science Week, the children became palaeontologists, delved into the depths of history through the discovery of various fossils. They engaged in lively discussions about the eras in which these fossils were unearthed and the creatures they once belonged to. The highlight, undoubtedly, the opportunity to interact with a pet dinosaur!


Adding to the excitement, we welcomed a visit from the Dogs Trust, who discussed caring for these pets, learning about their senses and the different jobs that they undertake in the community.

The whole school was also involved in determining the 'Best Biscuit to Dunk'. Each year group approached the challenge uniquely. Reception discussed the fate of the Gingerbread Man if he crossed the river without the fox's assistance. Key Stage 1 delved into the diverse world of biscuits, exploring their shapes, sizes and structure using their senses to describe each type. Lower Key Stage 2 investigated, 'What is the optimal tea temperature for biscuit dunking?' Whilst Year 6 examined how biscuit thickness and content impact the number of dunks achievable. Of course, no investigation would be complete without taste-testing and then using our knowledge to design the ultimate dunkable biscuit.

We are immensely proud of our Year Five children for rising to the challenges, supporting one another, and making memories that we hope will last a lifetime.
































Staffing


